

The materials have been revised by Kimberlin Education and Dairy Australia and a second edition released in 2018.



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
# RESOURCE DESCRIPTION

These Foundation activity ideas have been developed to help students investigate and understand more about the Australian dairy industry. Teachers are provided with suggested activities for different learning areas within the Australian Curriculum that support the teaching of curriculum links through the theme 'From Farm to Plate'.

We encourage teachers to assess the needs of their class, adapting the content and activities accordingly. The activities provided aim to spark student curiosity and inspire them to generate their own questions to investigate. The activities can be used as stand alone teaching ideas, incorporated into an existing program or used to support other inquiry units and resources found on the Discover Dairy website.

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# ENGLISH ACTIVITY IDEAS

- Investigate the places where dairy farmers live and create a simple map. Students label their map and present it to the class or small groups.
- Explore stories, songs and rhymes about farms.
  Challenge students to retell the story individually or in small groups through play.
- Use images of dairy farms to discuss their features.
  Encourage students to explore unknown words to build their vocabulary.
- Use factual texts to find information about places on dairy farms. Jointly construct an informative text using the information learned.
- Model creating descriptive sentences using images and videos of dairy farms as stimulus.
- Encourage students to discuss real life experiences they might have had on a farm. What did they see, smell, taste, hear and feel?

# Curriculum links - English

Understand that texts can take many forms, can be very short (for example an exit sign) or quite long (for example an information book or a film) and that stories and informative texts have different purposes (ACELA1430)

#### Literature

Identify some features of texts including events and characters and retell events from a text (ACELT1578)

Listen to and respond orally to texts and to the communication of others in informal and structured classroom situations (ACELY1646)

Deliver short oral presentations to peers (ACELY1647)

Create short texts to explore, record and report ideas and events using familiar words and beginning writing knowledge (ACELY1651)



# **SCIENCE ACTIVITY IDEAS**

- 2
- Draw a dairy cow and label its external features.
- Explore a dairy farm and identify the different areas: e.g. pastures, milking shed, silos, milk vats, fences, ponds
- Investigate how dairy farmers care for their animals.
  As a class, brainstorm ideas and create a display.
- Model the creation of a food chain including sun, grass, cows and humans. Students label and illustrate the food chains, drawing comparisons with other farm animal food chains.
- Discuss how the weather might affect cows and other animals on a dairy farm. Students draw pictures that reflect what they think animals might need on different days depending on the weather e.g. a sunny day or a rainy day.



# HUMANITIES AND SOCIAL SCIENCES ACTIVITY IDEAS

- Ask students to talk to members of their family to find out if any relatives or friends have ever owned or worked on a farm. If the student currently lives on a farm, ask them to find out how long the farm has belonged to their family.
- Use pictures and stories of farming families from the Discover Dairy website to tell their stories. Students identify things that they may have in common with members of the dairy family.
- Find a dairy farm on Google Earth and discuss where it is in relation to the school.
- Look at pictures and videos of dairy farms and discuss the importance of them. Talk about what people need to live on a farm.
- Ask students to think about what they might hear, see, smell and feel if they were to visit a dairy farm.
